## **About IDSK**

**The Institute of Development Studies Kolkata (IDSK)**, was promoted by the Government of West Bengal as an autonomous centre of excellence in social sciences and was founded in 2002 as a registered society with a governing body comprising eminent scholars and Government's nominees. It is fully funded by the Government of West Bengal. During the twenty-two years of its existence, IDSK has made its mark in the world of research in social sciences and humanities in India. In 2014 the Indian Council of Social Science Research (ICSSR) recognized IDSK under the 'New Category of ICSSR Recognized Institutes'.

The Governing Council of IDSK comprises eminent scholars and representatives of the Government of West Bengal. The Council is now headed by Professor Sabyasachi Basu Ray Chaudhury as the President.

IDSK is devoted to advanced academic research and informed policy advice in the areas of education, health, gender, employment, technology, communication, governance, climate change, tribal issues, human sciences and economic development. Other important programmes included training of research scholars in the social sciences working towards MPhil or PhD degrees. IDSK conducts PhD in Development Studies in collaboration with the University of Calcutta. The Institute is committed to dissemination of its research findings through workshops, seminars, publications in the media, and other public counselling and education programmes.

IDSK has actively collaborated with a good number of academic institutions in India and abroad. Its close association with the University of Calcutta started since its inception. Other institutions with which IDSK has actively collaborated in the recent years include the Monash University (Australia), University of Melbourne, University of Geneva, University of Rome "La Sapienza", Italy, and others.

IDSK took an initiative to set up an archive on the history of Salt Lake in celebration of the fiftieth year of the township in the past year. The generous donation of rupees one lakh that IDSK received from Professor Amiya Kumar Bagchi, Founder-Director and Emeritus Professor of IDSK, is being utilised for the purpose. The archive is dedicated to the memory of Professor Jasodhara Bagchi.

### **PROGRAMME ADMINISTRATION**

The PhD programme in Development Studies, introduced in 2016, is affiliated to the University of Calcutta. The programme conforms to the pattern of the existing PhD programmes run by the University and is guided by the University of Calcutta Regulations for PhD, 2016. As a recognised 'sister institute' of the University of Calcutta, IDSK is responsible for designing the course modules for the compulsory course work and offering them in accordance with the requirement. The PhD supervisors are all regular members of the

faculty of IDSK. Eminent faculty from other institutions may be invited to be joint/associate supervisors, if needed. The programme is conducted with the approval of the PhD Research Advisory Committee for Development Studies, comprising eminent social scientists nominated by the Vice Chancellor of the University of Calcutta, at each stage.

## **COURSE WORK**

The course work for PhD spans over two semesters. In the first semester, course modules on Perspectives in Development Studies and Research Methodology are offered. In the second semester, specialised modules are offered depending on the scholars' requirements. Specialised modules fall in five broad areas: Economics, Sociology, Political Science, History, and Regional Development.

## **AREAS of PhD WORK**

Broad areas of PhD work for the year 2026:

- Development Economics, Labour Economics
- Issues of Indian Economy, Poverty and Inequality
- Gerontology, Population Studies
- Climate Change and population health, occupational health
- Low Fertility and Family Demography, Cultural Demography

## **ELIGIBILITY**

Candidates with a Post Graduate Degree with at least 55% marks (50% for SC/ST/OBC) in any discipline from a UGC recognized University or an autonomous institution eligible to offer such degree can apply. The Reservation Policy of the State Government will be applicable in the selection of candidates. In keeping parity with the rules of Government of West Bengal, EWS/SC/ST/OBC candidates of states other than West Bengal are not entitled to get the benefit of reserved quota in educational institutions of West Bengal unless they can produce Domicile Certificate issued by the competent authority showing residence in West Bengal for at least ten years.

Eligible applicants will have to appear for a written examination. Those who qualify in it will be called for an interview. Candidates who have cleared UGC/CSIR (JRF) Examinations/NET/SET/SLET/ GATE/ Teacher Fellowship or have passed the MPhil/MTech/MD/ME/MPharm or any other equivalent examination are not required to appear at the entrance test but will have to appear for the interview. The final selection will be made on the basis of the candidate's performance in the interview. The number of scholars to be admitted this year will not exceed **twelve**.

Selected candidates will have to undertake coursework at IDSK during the first year of enrolment. After the defence of the research proposal at the PhD registration seminar by the candidate, she/he will be allowed to register with the University of Calcutta.

## LIBRARY FACILITY

The IDSK Knowledge Resource Centre or the Library is an ideal place for knowledge enhancement of academic as well as research professionals. It began functioning from December 2002 on the 5<sup>th</sup> floor of Alipore Campus of Calcutta University. It subsequently moved to IDSK campus at Salt Lake in 2010. The Library occupies two floors (2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> floor, 1700 sq. ft. each) of the southern block of the building.

The Library houses an impressive number of knowledge resources focussing on various research areas in Development Studies, Economics, Sociology, Demography, Education, Public Health, Political Science, Gender Studies, Anthropology, Ethnography, Environmental Studies, Regional Development, Human Sciences and Globalization. It has a total collection of 21005 processed documents including books, bound journals and other processed documents of which IDSK's collection is 10568, Rabindranath Tagore Centre for Human Development Studies' collection is 4102 and the rest 6346 are gifted collections.

From April 1, 2024 to 31<sup>st</sup> March 2025, the library has accessioned 102 purchased books, 28 gifted books and 1 PhD thesis. The Library subscribes the following print journals: *Journal of Indian Anthropological Society*, *Awards Digest*, *Review of Agrarian Studies*, *Biblio: A Review of*

*Books, Science and Culture, The Book Review, The Indian Journal of Labour Economics, Journal of Educational Planning and Administration, Sudhu Sundarban Charcha, Desh, Boier Desh, Social Scientist, Frontline, IASLIC Bulletin, Yojana.* Twenty four journals (online) of Sage publication, *EPW* (online), *Down To Earth* (online), *Grassroots* (online) have also been subscribed by the Library. The library has procured JSTOR Developing Nations Collection Package (More than 2000 Journals). The Library procures EPWRF India Time Series and Indiastat databases. The Library purchases four newspapers *The Hindu, Business Line, Business Standard* and *Labanhrad Sambad*.

The Library possesses tools for processing documents. These include Dewey Decimal Classification (DDC) 22<sup>nd</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup> edition, Anglo American Cataloguing Rules (AACR-2R), Sears List of Subject Headings 17<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> edition, C.A. Cutter's 3- figure Author table fully revised edition, American Library Association (ALA) filing rules.

The Library earlier used SOUL version 1 (Software for University Libraries) for its on-going automation activities. Till March 2018, the library has entered and processed 16231 documents in SOUL. Since April 2018 SOUL software is not used in full-fledged form. From December 2017, the library has started its automation functions in Koha. The library got more prominent look through its newly created website where all types of information regarding the library like about the library, collection, brief history, library committee, web opac, visitor counting, publications of IDSK faculty, notice regarding library etc. are found.

The Library provides services to different types of potential users who are the Students (M.Phil), Research Scholars (PhD), members of the faculty, members of Governing Council, Postdoctoral Fellows, Senior Research Fellows and Staff of this institution. The internal users enjoy library lending, document delivery and reading facilities. IDSK Library also provides reading facility to external scholars.

## **COMPUTER FACILITY**

IDSK has well-furnished computer lab along with adequate infrastructure with compatible computer hardware and latest networking equipment and software. Round the clock Internet access is available on campus to students, faculty and staff. All the computers on campus are connected through Ethernet based LAN. 15 MBPS leased line is used for Internet connection throughout the campus. It has a computer lab with 20 desktop PCs connected to the Internet and available for use by students and research staff. Network laser printers and HP colour scanners are available for printing and scanning purposes. The OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue) of our library can also be accessed from the PCs in the computer lab. The servers are Red Hat Enterprise LINUX and Server 2008. Other than the regular Windows 7 and Windows 8.1 operating system, MS Office and Adobe Professional packages for individual desktops, IDSK provides its faculty, research staff, and students with the latest statistical and econometric software such as Stata, SPSS, Eviews, Win Rats and Win Cats. In

addition, students opting for different courses receive adequate training in certain free softwares such as CSPro and AdePT.
